COLLECTIVE MAKING: MULTIPLYING
PERSPECTIVES IN CURATORIAL KNOWLEDGE
PRODUCTION & PEDAGOGY

The consequences of colonial divisions spill over into contemporary practices of creation in the curatorial field. This lecture maps a way to overcome this divide, to make oppositions fruitful by means of decolonial curatorial transgression. The guiding metaphor is Kpaaza from the oeuvre of the late Nigerian modernist Uche Okeke, a term that at the same time encompasses a spring in Nimo/Nigeria, de/coloniality and utopia. It has been extensively explored in the ongoing exhibition and research project We Will Now Go To Kpaaza (curated by the late Ijeoma Uche-Okeke and Nantume Violet, 2022). In Kpaaza, the two approaches of Asele and UNDER GROUND converge in the exhibition but more so well as its making that emerges from a vast field of idiomatic expressions, fluidity and conceptual resources, which continue to reassert a reference of African art history and its potential to bring forth fresh pedagogical models in cultural practices. Through the quotidian practice/practice of collective making, we attempt to decontextualize the very foundations of art and knowledge production to root it into multiple entanglements, processes and heterotopic destinies.

NANTUME VIOLET is a curator and director at UNDER GROUND, a nomadic contemporary art space in Kampala, Uganda. She has worked as a cultural producer for ten years and has collaborated with artists and curators in Eastern Africa, Ghana, South Africa, and Germany. Together with the late ljeoma Loren Uche-Okeke she has curated the exhibition, We Will now Go To Kpaaza, which relates to the work and legacy of modernist master Uche Okeke, at Iwalewahaus at Bayreuth University in Germany. She has also, together with Julia Gyemant, co-curated the exhibition, That Those Beings Be Not Being, at the Alpha nova & Galerie Futura in Berlin.



Alongside her sister, late Ijeoma Uche-Okeke, SALMA UCHE-OKEKE has been actively ensuring that the Uche Okeke Legacy is sustained and grown. This has

resulted in the family electing her to be the first CEO of *The Prof Uche Okeke Legacy Limited (PUOLL)* in 2019.
